With the end of year upon us, I thought I would recap the work your Rolling Fields commission has accomplished this year.

- Passed an ordinance pertaining to rental houses, both long-term and short-term, which will be distributed before year-end.
- Conducted meetings with several residents regarding speeding concerns.
- Added a 3-way stop at Pennington and Canoe Lanes, implemented use of flashing speed signs on Country Lane, and increased police presence to mitigate speeding.
- Redesigned our tree program to incentivize neighbors to plant large, canopy-type trees along our roadways.

One of the main thoroughfares in Rolling Fields is Rolling Lane. It intersects Pennington Lane not once but twice before ending at Fairway Lane. Rolling Lane is frequented by residents and visitors of all ages who travel by automobile, golf cart, mini bike, scooter, bicycle and skateboard. This, of course is in addition to the many joggers and walkers traversing the Lane.

Rolling Lane consists of 28 homes owned by some of the nicest neighbors you'll ever meet. "Family friendly" is a real understatement. Among the folks currently living on the street are a handful of "generation residents" who don't have to walk far for family functions. There's a young family who moved around the corner from his parents, an older parent who moved a few doors down from her son and his family, and another young family who bought a grandparent's home. There's even a brother and sister who live across the street from each other.

As a youngster, I have many fond memories of Rolling Lane. I was a frequent visitor at my grandmother's home. She was one of the original residents in the mid-1950s and coincidentally, my wife Kendy and I purchased the home right next door and moved into the neighborhood in 1995.

Rolling Lane is also home to a wide variety of four-legged animals. There are several residents with traditional domestic pets including dogs and cats. We have our population of squirrels and chipmunks and it is not uncommon to spot other wild animals wandering in the neighborhood such as deer, raccoons, foxes, possums and even coyotes.

All of this is what makes Rolling Fields a wonderful place to live.

2ND PRES WEEKDAY SCHOOL

Rolling Fields local preschool, Second Presbyterian Weekday School, celebrates its 65th birthday this year! The school is located in Second Presbyterian Church in our backyard. There are currently 24 families in our neighborhood whose children attend the preschool, and many parents from the neighborhood attended the school when they were preschool age.



When the school was founded in 1954 it was one of the first early childhood facilities in Louisville, with 4 teachers and 20 children.

Today the school has a staff of 45 and 197 children! The Weekday School added the Infant-Toddler Program in 2013, which serves 6 week olds through 23 months, feeding into the school for two year olds through kindergarten.



The school offers a developmentally appropriate program that recognizes that each child is unique, with different patterns of growth, likes and dislikes, learning styles and experiences. The focus is on the whole child--physical, emotional, social, cognitive, moral, spiritual and creative. The teachers attend conferences each year to further their education in early childhood practices, and many of them have degrees in education and related fields.

Lisa Warner has been the director of the Weekday School for 25 years. She has been an advocate for the young children as well as a wonderful mentor for fellow staff, and acts as family counselor to school

families going through life changes such as divorce and death. She most recently has spearheaded a drive to create an outdoor classroom, expanding and enriching the current playground behind the Church. Lisa is retiring at the end of this school year, and a search committee is seeking a new director to carry out its mission. The school will continue to serve young families from our area, and as well as Prospect and southern Indiana and will maintain the same philosophy it always has had.





If you have never stopped in to see the children at play, Lisa and staff welcome visitors! The hallways are always full of laughter and songs as well as children's artwork. It is a very happy place to spend a morning.

WASTE MANAGEMENT REMINDERS

NEW HOME RENTAL ORDINANCE

Proactively addressing questions around home rentals, the Rolling Fields Commission passed an ordinance in July regulating all rentals and specifically short term rentals of 15 days or less. The ordinance basically says that if you plan to rent your house, or part of it, you will need to secure a \$150 annual permit. Permitting is required for any home rental and short-term rentals are limited to a cumulative total of fifteen (15) days per year. So renting out your house for Derby is a possibility, but likely not becoming an Airbnb or VRBO. The fines for violations are progressive all the way up to \$10,000 per violation, so if you plan to pursue any sort of rental you will want to be in full compliance with the ordinance.
