Fairway Lane

With only 28 houses on Fairway Lane, one would think this little street on the third and fourth holes of Louisville Country Club's golf course would be a quiet place to live. And nearly 30 years ago, that would have been correct. The tide of "quiet" began to change in 1991 when the first children in over 25 years moved onto the street. Martha and John Heyburn moved into a home that had been in the Heyburn family with their son Will, then 2 1/2 years old and Jack, only 4 weeks old. Just two years later, Merrell and Craig Grant added playmates for the Heyburn boys with their children Campbell and Allison. When the Creasons, Tachaus and Boomers moved onto the street with their children, the turnover from a child-free street, to a child-friendly street became complete. For several years, Fairway Lane must have been a Halloween goldmine for the children on the street as they were the only children. These "elders" of the street set the bar high for the young ones.

The turn of the millennium brought a wave of young families. Today there are 30 children college-age and

younger living (and driving!) on the street! Of the 30, 22 of them are boys. The sounds of football, basketball and soccer games as well as late night games of "Infection" can be heard throughout Rolling Fields! None of these children can claim they are bored and there is always someone on hand to play or ride bikes to Rite Aid. The children are friends and that might be the result of them attending 10 different grade, middle and high schools! Busy schedules and a few off at college make these once-daily play times a rarity. But on certain nights, when the stars are aligned, you can hear the screams and laughter that have made this small street a certain never-never Land for the children of Fairway Lane!

Ordinance Reminders



As the routine yard work kicks into gear, we would like to remind residents of the City's ordinance related to lawn care. Rolling Fields

Ordinance 07-04 states that commercial lawn care is restricted to the following times – Monday through Thursday 8 AM to 7 PM and Friday 8 AM to 5 PM. We ask that residents make their contracted lawn services aware of these permitted times.

We would also like to remind residents that street parking is not permitted on any night between 2 AM and 5 AM, per Rolling Fields Ordinance 99-05. Indian Hills Police Officers monitor the area for these violations and do issue warnings or citations when necessary.

ORDINANCE SPOTLIGHT

Just a reminder that building permits are required for all construction in Rolling Fields. Once your plans have been approved by the Metro Building Department submit TWO sets of plans or drawings for approval to Mayor David Dunn at david@louisvilleins.com or 512 Tiffany Lane, 40207. Hand drawings of small projects are acceptable. Send the \$100 fee, payable to City of Rolling Fields to Treasurer Joanna Nugent, 503 Rolling Lane, 40207.

COYOTE SAFETY

The animal in your backyard that looks like a small German Shephard may be a coyote. They range in color from yellowish tan to black and have erect ears with a bushy tail. You may even hear them howl at night as they are nocturnal animals. They live in families of up to 10 and the parents mate for life. The cubs will stay with the family until they are mature and then go forth to find their own territory. Coyotes range in weight from 30 to 45 pounds. Since they are predators anything that is smaller than they are is a "potential meal". The male and female work as a team to hunt their prey which includes: squirrels, rabbits, chipmunks, mice, rats, voles, fawns, possums, birds, cats and small dogs. Even a larger dog may be seen by the intelligent and territorial coyote as a threat and they may attack. Coyotes live in dens which they establish in old logs, brush piles, culverts, under a fallen tree, under a shed or building or even in holes which they dig or which have been abandoned by other animals. Pups are born in April and it is very important to not approach a den or to get close to the pups.

AVOIDING COYOTE PROBLEMS

- Eliminate brush and compost piles which will attract them
- Do not leave pet food or bird seed on the ground as it attracts the animals that coyotes eat
- Secure your garbage with a tight-fitting lid or inside a garage
- Clean your grill and drip pan which attracts coyotes
- Dog waste in the yard attracts coyotes
- Keep cats inside and do not feed feral cats
- SUPERVISE your children when they are outside even in fenced area
- Install motion sensing lights or burn outside lights at night
- Walk your dog on a short brightly colored leash so that the coyote sees the dog as a part of you

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ENCOUNTER A COYOTE

- If you are near their den or their pups back away
- Do not turn your back and do not run away
- If they are in your yard make a loud noise to scare them away and continue to do so until they are out of sight (Do not do this if the pups are around)
- Pick up children and small dogs
- Do not approach a coyote to take photographs

POLLINATORS

Ann Price Davis has lived most of her life in Rolling Fields, having grown up in the house her parents, Charlie and Toddy Price built at 500 Club Lane in 1950. After a brief stint in Crescent Hill, Ann and her husband John moved to Country Lane 38 years ago. John, by the way, didn't have far to search for true love, having grown up at 513 Club Lane. And there must be something about the neighborhood; their son Ian lives on Edmond Lane.

Ann recalls a childhood with the many flowering plants and trees we enjoy in Rolling Fields, which provides a segue to the celebration of National Pollinator Week, June 19-25.

Let's make Rolling Fields more appealing to butterflies, bumblebees, birds, bats, and beetles -- for ourselves, our children and grandchildren. Here are some things you can do to attract these critical pollinating critters:

- Plant food.

Bees depend on nectar and pollen for sustenance -- they love monarda (bee balm!), and other white, yellow, and blue flowers like cosmos, snapdragons and hostas.

Butterflies favor bright red, orange, and purple blossoms like cone flowers, daylilies and asters. Moths are drawn to pinks or whites like cleome and nicotiana. Caterpillars need to eat (lots) before they can metamorphose into butterflies. And they are pretty specific about what they like...the Eastern Tiger Swallowtail eats ash, basswood and tulip tree. Henry's Elfin, a little brown moth, depends on redbuds and viburnum, while Monarchs need milkweeds.

- Provide a source of water --

perhaps float a cork in a shallow bird bath as a landing pad.

- Give them hiding places and nesting sites,

where the lawn service blowers won't reach. Leave some areas of your yard unmown or unpruned.

- Ease up on the pesticides.

Use the least toxic option when you have a problem.

And relax -- if the lawn is green, that's enough!
